Statistical Data Report for June 2025, Released August 2025

State Employment and Unemployment

Unemployment rates were lower in June in 2 states, higher in 1 state, and stable in 47 states and the District of Columbia, the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics reported. Nineteen states and the district had jobless rate increases from a year earlier, 4 states had decreases, and 27 states had little change. The national unemployment rate, 4.1 percent, changed little over the month and was the same as in June 2024.

In June 2025, nonfarm payroll employment increased in 1 state and was essentially unchanged in 49 states and the District of Columbia. Over the year, nonfarm payroll employment increased in 15 states and was essentially unchanged in 35 states and the district.

South Dakota had the lowest jobless rate in June, 1.8 percent. The District of Columbia had the highest unemployment rate, 5.9 percent. The next highest rates were in California and Nevada, 5.4 percent each. In total, 18 states had unemployment rates lower than the U.S. figure of 4.1 percent, 6 states and the district had higher rates, and 26 states had rates that were not appreciably different from that of the nation.

In June, two states had unemployment rate decreases: Illinois (-0.2 percentage point) and Maine (-0.1 point). Virginia had the only rate increase (+0.1 percentage point). The remaining 47 states and the District of Columbia had jobless rates that were not notably different from those of a month earlier, though some had changes that were at least as large numerically as the significant changes.

In June 2025, nonfarm payroll employment increased in 1 state, Alaska (+3,100, or +0.9 percent), and was essentially unchanged in 49 states and the District of Columbia.

Over the year, nonfarm payroll employment increased in 15 states and was essentially unchanged in 35 states and the District of Columbia. The largest job gains occurred in Texas (+198,300), Florida (+142,300), and New York (+100,100). The largest percentage increase occurred in South Carolina (+2.9 percent), Idaho (+2.5 percent), and Hawaii (+2.3 percent).






