Statistical Data Report for November 2023, Released January 2024

State Employment and Unemployment

Unemployment rates were higher in November in 12 states and stable in 38 states and the District of Columbia, the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics reported. Twenty states had jobless rate decreases from a year earlier, 15 states and the District had increases, and 15 states had little change. The national unemployment rate edged down to 3.7 percent over the month and was little changed from November 2022.

Nonfarm payroll employment increased in 3 states and was essentially unchanged in 47 states and the District of Columbia in November 2023. Over the year, nonfarm payroll employment increased in 28 states and was essentially unchanged in 22 states and the District.

Maryland had the lowest jobless rate in November, 1.8 percent. The next lowest rate was in North Dakota, 1.9 percent. Nevada had the highest unemployment rate, 5.4 percent. In total, 19 states had unemployment rates lower than the U.S. figure of 3.7 percent, 5 states and the District of Columbia had higher rates, and 26 states had rates that were not appreciably different from that of the nation.







Unemployment rates were higher in November than a year earlier in 214 of the 389 metropolitan areas, lower in 158 areas, and unchanged in 17 areas, the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics reported today (BLS News Release, "Metropolitan Area Employment and Unemployment – November 2023"). A total of 15 areas had jobless rates of less than 2.0 percent and 6 areas had rates of at least 8.0 percent. Nonfarm payroll employment increased over the year in 58 metropolitan areas and was essentially unchanged in 331 areas. The national unemployment rate in November was 3.5 percent, not seasonally adjusted, little changed from a year earlier.

Employers finished 2023 with far fewer open positions than at the start of the year, according to private-sector estimates, as businesses filled more jobs and decided not to hire for others (Gabriel T. Rubin & Harriet Torry, WSJ, "Finding a New Job Is Getting Harder"). Total job postings as of the end of 2023 declined more than 15% from a year earlier, according to data from job-listing site Indeed through Dec. 29. "The pace of descent seems to have leveled off a bit in the second half of the year," said Nick Bunker, an economist at the jobs site. Job postings are still up by more than a quarter from their prepandemic levels, Indeed's data show. But the frenzied hiring and worker shortages that marked an earlier phase of the pandemic recovery are fading, even as unemployment remains low, boosting economists' hopes of what is called a "soft landing" for the U.S. economy. Federal figures show a similar trend: the number of available jobs fell last year, though the number remains higher than before the pandemic began and greater than the number of unemployed Americans seeking work. The Labor Department released job openings data through November on Wednesday showing that there were 8.8 million job openings, down from a recent peak of 12 million in March 2022. The Labor Department will also publish the December jobs report on Friday.

A key factor that pushed up mortgage rates over the past two years is now starting to pull them down (Ben Eisen, WSJ, "The Hidden Force Pushing Mortgage Rates Down"). Average 30-year fixed mortgage rates have been higher usual relative to the benchmark Treasury yields they typically track. But that extra differential, or spread, has been shrinking for eight straight weeks. It is now at its lowest since March. The 30-year mortgage rate has fallen by more than a percentage point recently to 6.61%, according to data released by mortgage giant Freddie Mac last week. The shrinking spread between that and the 10-year Treasury yield amounts to roughly one-sixth of the decline. (Treasury yields have also fallen sharply.) The spread is still far larger than its historical average. But its downward trend is giving mortgage rates an extra push lower. It is a boon to would-be home buyers who have been sidelined by high borrowing costs, as well as to hard-up mortgage lenders and real-estate agents.
