Statistical Data Report for March 2025, Released May 2025

State Employment and Unemployment

Unemployment rates were higher in March in 3 states, lower in 1 state, and stable in 46 states and the District of Columbia, the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics reported. Twentyeight states and the district had jobless rate increases from a year earlier, 1 state had a decrease, and 21 states had little change. The national unemployment rate changed little over the month at 4.2 percent but was 0.3 percentage point higher than in March 2024.

Nonfarm payroll employment increased in 6 states and was essentially unchanged in 44 states and the District of Columbia in March 2025. Over the year, nonfarm payroll employment increased in 13 states and was essentially unchanged in 37 states and the district.

South Dakota had the lowest jobless rate in March, 1.8 percent. Nevada had the highest unemployment rate, 5.7 percent. In total, 18 states had unemployment rates lower than the U.S. figure of 4.2 percent, 5 states and the District of Columbia had higher rates, and 27 states had rates that were not appreciably different from that of the nation.






