Economic Growth Region 9

Statistical Data Report for August 2025, Released October 2025

State Employment and Unemployment

Unemployment rates were higher in August in 3 states, lower in 2 states, and stable in 45 states and the District of Columbia, the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics reported. Seventeen states and the district had jobless rate increases from a year earlier, 9 states had decreases, and 24 states had little change. The national unemployment rate, 4.3 percent, changed little over the month and from August 2024.

In August 2025, nonfarm payroll employment increased in 1 state, decreased in the district of Columbia, and was essentially unchanged in 49 states. Over the year, nonfarm payroll employment increased in 20 states and was essentially unchanged in 30 states and the district.

South Dakota had the lowest jobless rate in August, 1.9 percent. The District of Columbia had the highest unemployment rate, 6.0 percent. The next highest rate was in California, 5.5 percent. In total, 22 states had unemployment rates lower than the U.S. figure of 4.3 percent, 3 states and the district had higher rates, and 25 states had rates that were not appreciably different from that of the nation.






Local Area Unemployment Statistics (LAUS): Captures Indiana's labor force, which includes those currently employed and those who are unemployed and actively seeking work.
